Strategic Planning for Non-Profit Organizations

The previous article in the Spring 2018 issue of Visnyk (pages 9-11) dealt with important issues pertaining to governance, which focuses on ensuring that an organization is viable and that it is achieving its mission. Our series on organizational development and capacity building continues with the topic of strategic planning.

A distinctive mark of a well-run organization is having in place a good plan, which is focused on desired long-term impact. Determining strategic directions for the next several years is one of the crucial steps in implementing an organization's vision, mandate and goals. Strategic plans may be from as short as three years to as long as ten years.

Literature on non-profit organizational development suggests different types of long-term organizational plans, such as a business plan and a strategic plan. No matter what the format is, the end result for an organization should be the identification of the strategic directions that will guide an organization to achieve the desired impact in the future. These strategic directions must specify clearly for both insiders and outsiders where the organization is going.

Strategic planning is one of the key responsibilities of a board of directors. Many non-profit boards choose to develop a formal strategic plan. This document outlines the desired future for an organization and provides a roadmap that defines how the organization will achieve it.* The benefit of a formal strategic plan is that everyone—board members, volunteers, and staff—has a

clear guide to action. Moreover, with the ever-increasing competition for grant and donor money, an organization with a strategic plan stands out positively.

There are a couple of ways to move forward with developing a strategic plan. An organization could engage the services of an outside facilitator or consultant; alternatively, the strategic planning process could be led by capable people from within the organization itself.

With no shortage of information on strategic planning—a Google search of "strategic plan" returned about 339 million results—there is definitely a lot of choice as to which model for strategic planning to follow or which tools to use. Below are three trustworthy sources on strategic planning in non-profit cultural organizations:

One advantage of hiring a consultant is their knowledge and ability to design the planning process in an organized and cost-efficient manner. Board members and staff might lack the necessary time and experience to design a process that would, in the end, yield effective results. Hence, the high costs associated with facilitator fees, which may at first be seen as an unaffordable expense, could prove to actually be a worthwhile investment.

For many organizations, consultant costs may be completely out of their budget scope. However, there are opportunities to draw outside money for this purpose. Some funders offer capacity building grants, which are designed to help offset expenses for capacity building activities. Funders that provide capacity building grants include UCC Saskatchewan through its Hromada Legacy Fund, and the Saskatoon Community Foundation.

To conclude, strategic planning may be seen as overwhelming, but it is a good way for an organization to reconnect with and involve stakeholders, address critical issues, and identify priorities, all of which helps to achieve greater impact.

The **Hromada Legacy Fund** program has a separate funding category, which is designed to support the cultural and organizational development of UCC Saskatchewan's branches and members:

C-1) Building Community Capacity: Organization & Branch Development Funding Category

Grants of up to \$2,000 are available to UCC Saskatchewan member organizations/branches for activities, which aim to increase volunteer participation in their organizations. Activities may include:

- a. volunteer recruitment, retention and recognition programs
- b. youth and immigrant-newcomer outreach projects
- c. organizational and skills development workshops
- d. strategic planning, community consultations

Meet the SaskTanets Summer Ukrainian Dance Program Instructors

For the third summer, we welcome back Andriy Demeshchuk and Lana Niland.

He enjoyed performing in such destinations as Canada, USA, South America, Australia, China and Japan. At a young age with Virsky he earned the title of Artist of Ukraine. She currently is completing the "One Year in Ukraine" Dance Program with Cobblestone Freeway. Upon returning to Canada, she will continue her dance career with the Pavlychenko Folklorique Ensemble of Saskatoon while start-

ing her studies at the University of Saskatchewan. Natalya is excited to continue her education in Ukrainian dance and this opportunity with SaskTanets is another step in that direction.

The SaskTanets Mentorship program is designed to identify and hone the mentees' skills and develop their leadership potential. This is an opportunity for young dance instructors to be mentored by our Virsky alumni, Andriy Demeshchuk and Lana Niland, at the UCC Saskatchewan SaskTanets 2018 Summer Ukrainian Dance Program. The successful applicants will work with and assist the mentors at the Dancer Camp. They will observe the mentor and get hands-on experience with the participants. Following the Dancer Camp, the applicants will attend the Instructor Workshop portion of the program.

The UCC Saskatchewan SaskTanets 2018 Summer Ukrainian Dance Program is the only event of its kind in Saskatchewan. The program consists of two components: a five-day Summer Ukrainian Dancer Camp welcomes dancers age 11 yrs+, and a three-day Instructor Professional Development Workshop for both new and experienced instructors age 16 yrs+. The program goal is to provide a healthy, safe environment for youth dancers to learn about Ukrainian culture, gain dance knowledge through active sessions, and develop confidence to become young leaders in their dance community. The Instructor Workshop focuses on giving our Saskatchewan Ukrainian dance instructors the tools to teach young dancers with care, knowledge and confidence. Professional instructors from Ukraine lead the weeklong camp. The Dancer Camp is July 15-19, 2018 and the Instructor Workshop—July 20-22, 2018. Both will be held at Rosthern Junior College in Rosthern, SK.



Якщо ви плануєте подорож до України, то передовсім переконайтеся в тому, що термін дії вашого українського паспорту та канадської карти резидента є чинними протягом подорожі та щонайменше 6 місяців від дати запланованого повернення з України. Якщо вам потрібно отримати новий закордонний паспорт України, це можна зробити у Генеральному Консульстві України в Торонто:

На цьому сайті ви також знайдете інформацію про те, що і в якій кількості дозволено або недозволено ввозити до Канади. Щодо фінансів, наприклад, обмежень на суму грошей, які особа хоче завезти до чи вивезти з Канади немає, але, починаючи з суми \$10 000 і вище, кошти повинні бути задекларовані. Якщо ви провели за межами Канади більше 7 днів, то вам дозволено завезти до країни без сплати податків товарів на суму \$800*. З них, алкогольних напоїв: до 1.5 літрів вина, або 1.14 літрів міцних напоїв, або 8.5 літрів пива; тютюнових виробів: 200 сигарет або 50 сигар.

Якщо ви маєте коштовності, скажімо ювелірні прикраси, то краще їх у подорож не брати. Якщо такі речі вам конче необхідні, то рекомендується мати їх опис з доданим фото, зробленим у ювелірній крамниці чи страховій компанії. Якщо коштовності придбані у Канаді комусь у подарунок — майте із собою квитанцію оплати.

Зауважте, що не дозволяється завозити до Канади продукти, які можуть бути джерелом санітарного ризику. Зокрема: їжа (м'ясні вироби, ковбаси, картопля, фрукти), вироби ручної роботи з пір'я, рослин чи дерева, а також живі птахи чи саджанці дерев.

Якщо ви приймаєте медичні препарати, візьміть із собою рецепт від лікаря. Деякі медикаменти, які визнані у Канаді, можуть трактуватися нелегальними в інших країнах і навпаки. Ліки мають бути в оригінальній упаковці на якій вказана назва препарату. Найкраще зв'язатися з представництвом країни до якої ви плануєте подорож і запитати про легітимність ваших лік у тій країні. Для тих, хто подорожує з дітьми, звертаємо увагу на те, що дітям, які перетинають кордон лише з одним із батьків, або з опікуном, потрібен дозвіл на виїзд за кордон малолітніх дітей Consent letter for children travelling abroad. Такий дозвіл потрібен особам до 18-19 років (залежно від провінції Канади). У Саскачевані повнолітніми вважаються особи віком 18 років, а в Україні — особи віком 16 років та старші. Зразок дозволу українською можна отримати у Генконсульстві України в Торонто, або звернувшись до радників з питань поселення іммігрантів при КУК Саскачевану. Для того, щоб цей документ набув легальної сили в Україні, його треба легалізувати в Генеральному Консульстві України в Торонто, будучи особисто присутнім при завіренні. Якщо ж ви такої можливості не маєте, вам необхідно буде зробити наступні кроки у відповідній послідовності:

Eaton Internment Site Memorial Garden Dedication



Event Marks Beginning of Year of Remembrance By Jennifer Fedun

On the morning of May 25th, with a cool breeze blowing across the open prairie landscape, the Eaton Internment Site Memorial Garden was dedicated. This site, now the home of the Saskatchewan Railway Museum, is located just a few miles southwest of Saskatoon. While this area is presently a beautiful and quiet corner of the province, Eaton was, at one time, part of a more tragic and unfair chapter in Canadian history.

In February 1919, 65 men deemed "enemy aliens" by the Canadian government were transported from the Munson Internment Camp in Alberta to a Saskatchewan railway siding known as Eaton. They were enemy aliens not due to any action of their own, but because they had been declared as such through the establishment of the War Measures Act of 1914. Although the First World War had resolved by this time and the Central Powers were no longer at war with Canada, many of those who had come to this country from those "enemy" nations were viewed with suspicion and were held in custody by the federal government. Ultimately, 8,579 individuals were interned in 24 different camps during Canada's First National Internment Operations of 1914-1920. Of these individuals, the single largest ethnic group was Ukrainian.

Through the joint effort of four pro-

ject partners—the Ukrainian Canadian Congress of Saskatchewan (UCC Saskatchewan), the Saskatchewan German Council (SGC), the Prairie Centre for the Study of Ukrainian Heritage (PCUH) at the University of Saskatchewan, and the Saskatchewan Railway Museum (SRM)—a planning committee was convened. Plans were confirmed to install a bronze memorial plaque, detailing the history of the

Eaton site in English, French, Ukrainian, and German. A park-style bench was also purchased. These pieces were to complement the Fortitude monument that had been erected by PCUH in 2004, and would come together to form the Eaton Internment Site Memorial Garden.

On the Garden's dedication day, MC Nykola Dovgyy warmly welcomed the 60-70 guests. Following welcoming remarks

by SRM Chair Calvin Sexsmith, UCC Saskatchewan President Mary Ann Trischuk, SGC President Josephin Dick and PCUH Director Dr. Bohdan Kordan, the following dignitaries brought greetings: The Honourable Don Morgan, Minister of Justice and Attorney General, Government of Saskatchewan; Judy Harwood, Reeve, RM of Corman Park; and, Emil Yereniuk, Chair, Canadian First World War Internment Recognition Fund Endowment Council. Following this, a German poem, "Schatten der Vergangenheit" ("Shadows of the Past") was read by students from SGC's German-language program, and both a kalyna and an elder (of significance to Ukrainians and Germans, respectively) were planted on the sides of the Fortitude monument to represent eternal memory. Special prayers and a blessing were given by Very Rev. Archpriest Janko Kolosnjaji (Ukrainian Catholic Eparchy of Saskatoon), Very Rev. Fr. Kevin McGee (Roman Catholic Diocese of Saskatoon), Very Rev. Archpriest Taras Makowsky (Ukrainian Orthodox Cathedral of the Holy Trinity, Saskatoon) and Very Rev. Archpriest Bohdan Demczuk (North Battleford & Area Ukrainian Orthodox Parish District). The program culminated in the singing of "O Canada," with refreshments enjoyed by all afterward.

The Eaton Internment Site Memorial Garden will stand as a testimony to the history of Canada's First National Internment Operations of 1914-1920, and will be one part of UCC Saskatchewan's continued education initiatives in bringing

forward the stories of those who unjustly suffered as "enemy aliens."

Dialogue on Genocide Education Held in Saskatoon

In recognition of April as Genocide Remembrance, Condemnation and Prevention Month, the Canadian Museum for Human Rights (CMHR) in Winnipeg and Ukraine's Holodomor Victims Memorial National Museum (HVMNM) in Kyiv began a joint initiative to offer communities the opportunity to host public events that encourage dialogue on genocide education.

UCC Saskatchewan and UCC Saskatoon co-hosted such an event on April 26, 2018 at the Saskatoon Public Library. About 45 people attended "Perceptions of Genocide: Telling Our Stories, Owning Our History," a cross-cultural dialogue that explored the importance of genocide education, how to educate or inform about the world's genocides and the public role that museums play, and what young people can learn regarding genocide.

The Director General of HVMNM, Olesia Stasiuk, and the President and CEO of the CMHR, Dr. John Young, delivered keynote addresses, which were followed by a panel dis-

cussion with David Katzman, Provincial Co-ordinator Fighting Anti-Semitism Together/Voices In Action; Ken Krawetz, former Saskatchewan Deputy Premier, Minister of Education and Minister of Finance; and, Michelle Brass, Brass Law Office, Peepeekisis First Nation, Treaty 4 Territory of Saskatchewan.

The guest speakers and invited panelists shared the perspectives of those whose lives and communities suffered incredible loss by what is referred to as genocide.

The event concluded with a question and answer session. It was agreed that the need and desire exist to continue the dialogue on genocide education, and that it plays an important role both in helping communities affected by genocide come together for understanding and support, and in contributing to the healing process.

Ms. Stasiuk and Dr. Young also took part in presentations held in Winnipeg, Edmonton, Toronto, Montreal and Ottawa.

The morning started with a tour of the Western Development Museum with WDM staff members Joan Kanigan (CEO), Dr. Elizabeth Scott (Curator), Corinne Daelick (Director of Education), and Diana Savage (Exhibits Manager). Our guests were very impressed with the museum, and the high quality of the exhibits. Online Petition to Save the Spirit Lake Internment Camp Cemetery More supporters from Saskatchewan needed, deadline to sign — August 15, 2018

Concerned over the deterioration of the internee cemetery at Spirit Lake, Quebec, Dr. Lubomyr Luciuk of the Ukrainian Canadian Civil Liberties Association (ucda.ca) has initiated an online petition addressed to the Government of Canada requesting action be taken to secure, restore, and reconsecrate this historic site and make limited access available for research, commemorative and religious purposes.

"The Spirit Lake internee cemetery has been in a deteriorating condition for many years," said Dr. Luciuk.

"This unique historic site will simply be erased from the cultural landscape if no determined government intervention occurs in the near future.


"Not one of the 16 men and some children who died at the Spirit Lake internment camp between 1915-1917 would ever have been there if the government had not branded them as 'enemy aliens'," explained Dr. Luciuk.

"So, regardless of whom Ottawa sold the land to, or what happened to it in the decades following, saving this internee cemetery from oblivion is a federal obligation, and long overdue."

Your Family History: Finding and Assembling the Pieces Saskatchewan Genealogical Society Conference, April 20-22, 2018, Saskatoon

This event brought together 135 registrants and nine speakers from Saskatchewan and western Canada to learn about finding and assembling the pieces of their family histories. In five plenary and 19 small group sessions, participants discussed genealogical resources, research strategies and technological developments useful to the family historian. With varied levels of prior genealogical experience, participants also shared their questions, successes and pointers with other family historians. Complimentary preconference tours to the Provincial and University Archives. City of Saskatoon Archives, and the Saskatoon Museum of Military Artifacts provided opportunities to view these important resource facilities.

Information was also provided to registrants about other Saskatoon attractions, including the Ukrainian Museum of Canada. Hosted by the Saskatoon Branch, the event was also the site of the 2018 Annual General Meeting of the Saskatchewan Genealogical Society.

Of those attending the conference, 20 participated in the small group session, "Using the Gazetteer of Galicia to Locate Your Ukrainian Village of Origin," in which John Althouse used his family's village of Antonov to illustrate how to find an ancestral village using the Genealogical Gazetteer of Galicia by Brian Lenius. This gazetteer lists places in the Kingdom of Galicia and Lodomeria, the largest province in the Austro-Hungarian Empire from 1772 to 1918.


John also used examples from his Ukrainian family in his talk, "A Little Walk Through the Cemetery." In this presentation, he described various discoveries he has made, especially in the Canora, SK area, including finding some tombstones with Cyrillic writing. These turned out to be those of his great-grandparents, which he had been unaware of! He gave tips about how to do genealogical research in cemeteries, and the information that can help a family his-

In addition to John's specific presentations related to Ukrainian heritage and family history, Brenda Smith discussed research sources for finding information on ancestors' migrations to Canada from Europe. In her presentation, "Moving to a New Life: European Migration Records Beyond Ships' Lists," she included discussion of the material available at Library and Archives Canada which details people arriving from Ukraine and other parts of eastern Europe. She also discussed the information available from the Miriam Weiner Roots to Roots Foundation which consolidates archival inventories from Lithuania, Poland, Ukraine, Moldova and Belarus.

Feedback from participants has been very positive about all aspects of the conference. Speakers also indicated that they found the conference to be well-organized, with engaged and enthusiastic participants.

The Saskatoon Branch of the Saskatchewan Genealogicual Society extends sincere thanks for the grant received from the Hromada Legacy Fund. This grant helped support John Althouse, who gave several presentations at the 2018 SGS Conference.

John Althouse is Saskatchewan-born and well known to genealogists in the province. A teacher by profession, he has always had a strong interest in heritage and history. John has done personal research related to his German ancestors from Germany and Volga Russia, Ukrainian ancestors, ancestors in the USA, Canada, as well as some limited research related to Ireland and England.





Summer Reading Suggestions

■ New Book by Boris Kishchuk Investigates Desire to Possess



Basic possessions such as food, shelter, and clothing are essential to our daily well-being. When we attain more than the essentials, life becomes complicated and there is more room for harmful behaviours to arise.

In his latest non-fiction title, *Possessions: Their Role in Anger, Greed, Envy, Jealousy, and Death* (DriverWorks Ink, 2018), author Boris W. Kishchuk examines how possession, in its various forms, affects people and society, particularly in the negative sense.

The interplay between possessions and anger, greed, envy, jealousy, and conflict is examined by way of historical examples, including those of murder and war caused from the pursuit of more possessions or territory.

Are we born with the desire to possess or is it a learned reaction? Does culture, self-uncertainty or fear influence our desire to possess? What do major religions say about possessions? What do our possessions say about ourselves? And what are some of the consequences of an excessive desire for possessions?

Boris Kishchuk has also written *Connecting with Ukraine* (2015), *Saskatchewan Crown Corporations* (2013), and *Long Term Care in Saskatchewan* (2010). He was named a UCC Saskatchewan Nation Builder in 2008.


