Board Adopts New Set of Guiding Statements, Regional Consultation Meetings Underway

Since the last update in the summer 2018 issue of *Visnyk*, the UCC Saskatchewan Board of Directors and staff have been hard at work on a new five-year strategic plan for our organization. As we stated in the first update, we want to ensure that UCC Saskatchewan is representing and supporting your needs as a Saskatchewan Ukrainian community organization.

An important step was taken in mid-September when the Board of Directors adopted new UCC Saskatchewan Vision, Mission Statement, Mandated Objectives and Values (see uc. sk.ca/en/ucc-spc/who-is-the-ucc-spc). They will guide this organization in our relationships with our members, branches, funders, stakeholders and partners.

During October, we are undertaking a series of five interactive regional community consultations. These have been carefully designed to seek your input through a discus-

sion of our priority directions. In this way, you can let us know if we are on the right track or if adjustments are required. News from the Canadian First World War Internment Recognition Fund (CFWWIRF)

Award-Winning Documentary Cross-Canada Release

CFWWIRF announces the cross-Canada release of the documentary, *That Never Happened, Canada's First National Internment Operations.* Produced by Ryan Boyko of Armistice Films, the documentary reveals the story of when over 88,000 people were forced to register and more than 8,500 were wrongfully imprisoned in internment camps across Canada, not for anything they had done but because of where they came from. In 1954 the public records were destroyed, and in the 1980s a few brave men and women began working to reclaim this chapter in history and ensure future generations would know about it.

That Never Happened will be screening on November 9, 10, 11 at the Roxy Theatre in Saskatoon and on November 10 and 11 at the Rainbow Cinema in Regina. For the complete-cross Canada screening schedule please visit www.armisticefilms.com.

CFWWIRF Unveils Augmented Reality Map

 $360\ Story\ Lab$ has created an augmented reality (AR) internment map for use in classrooms and museums.

Creator of the AR map Jeff Preyra describes the experience, "While standing in front of a large interactive map, visitors will be able to locate any of the camps featured and trigger an augmented reality experience on their smartphone or tablet. The

augmented reality uses text, video and still images to bring to life historic details of the camps, stories of the internment operations and even the experiences of actual internees. This exhibit is the first stage of a multi-staged project that aims to eventually



illuminate the complete history of Canada's First National Internment Operations in an accessible and personal way through the dynamic use of augmented and virtual reality."

National Internment Commemoration Day

October 28th day commemorates Canada's First National Internment Operations, the unjust internment of 8,579 so-called "enemy aliens." The affected communities include Ukrainians, Bulgarians, Croatians, Czechs, Germans, Hungarians, Italians, Jews, various people from the Ottoman Empire, Poles, Romanians, Russians, Serbians, Slovaks, Slovenes, among others, of which most were Ukrainians and most were civilians. Men, women and children needlessly suffered not because of any wrong they had done but only because of where they had come from, who they were. You are encouraged to participate in National Internment Commemoration Day by organizing a commemorative event to remember all the victims of this injustice in your community.

Представництво України у західній Канаді

У вересні 2018 відбулася важлива і довгоочікувана подія для українців західної Канади — відкриття Генерального Консульства України в Едмонтоні. Віднині мешканцям Альберти, Саскачевану, Британської Колумбії, Юкону, Нунавуту та Північно-Західних Територій для отримання послуг, де необхідна особиста присутність, не потрібно летіти до Торонто. Тепер ви зможете заощадити час та кошти коли виникне необхідність подати заяву на отримання паспорта громадянина України або засвідчити довіреність чи нотаріальну заяву.

Ми звернулися до новопризначеного Консула Надії Костенко із питаннями, що переважно надходять від наших клієнтів, і от що дізналися.

— Чи може консульство надати довідку про проживання за кордоном для громадян України, чиї родичі подаються на отримання субсидій для житлово-комунальних послуг в Україні?

— Саме такої довідки Генконсульство надати не може. Але, якщо Ви перебуваєте на консульському обліку, Генконсульство за Вашим письмовим зверненням може підтвердити цей факт. Оскільки на консульський облік приймаються громадяни України, які постійно проживають або тимчасово перебувають за кордоном, таке підтвердження може бути враховане при розрахунку плати за житлово-комунальні послуги.

— Чи потрібно виготовляти довіреність самостійно, чи Ви зробите це для клієнтів за певними стандартами?

— Бажано мати електронний варіант довіреності із собою. Якщо ж немає, то ми, звичайно, надрукуємо за побажанням відвідувача, але в такому разі варто записатися на прийом не на 30 хвилин, як це вказано у списку послуг, а на 1 годину.

— Чи виготовляєте Ви дозвіл на подорож за кордон неповнолітніх дітей з одним із батьків чи з опікунами?

— Дозвіл на подорож ми можемо виготовити, у нас ε відповідний зразок. Потрібні будуть свідоцтво про народження дитини (копія) і паспорт того з батьків, хто надаватиме дозвіл.

— Чи необхідно батькам чи дітям бути особисто присутнім для реєстрації громадянства України за народженням, чи можна це зробити поштою, надіславши необхідні документи?

— Документи для реєстрації громадянства можна надіслати поштою та вкласти передплачений зворотній конверт. Якщо свідоцтво про народження дитини канадське, необхідно одночасно надіслати його нам на легалізацію (відповідно додати *Money Order* на суму \$67).



Consulate General of Ukraine in western Canada. In this interview, newly-appointed Consul Nadiia Kostenko provides answers to questions—commonly asked by UCC Saskatchewan clients—related to certificates of residence, power of attorney, permission for underage children to travel with a single parent or guardian, and applying for Ukrainian citizenship for Canadian-born children of Ukrainian parents. Also provided are suggestions for citizens wishing to vote in the upcoming Ukrainian presidential and parliamentary elections, and contact information for the consulate in Edmonton, which opened September 7, 2018.

— Що б ви порадили громадянам України, що тимчасово чи постійно проживають у Канаді?

— У зв'язку з тим, що в наступному році в Україні плануються вибори (президентські та парламентські) радимо громадянам, які хочуть взяти участь у голосуванні яке, до речі, буде проводитись в приміщенні Генконсульства, перевірити дійсність своїх закордонних паспортів (бо з недійсним паспортом вони проголосувати не зможуть). Також радимо стати на консульський облік (постійний чи тимчасовий) для того, щоб потрапити у список виборців на нашій виборчій дільниці. Зауважте, що ті, хто стоять на постійному консульському обліку в Торонто, будуть переноситися на облік в ГКУ в Едмонтоні безкоштовно. Треба буде лише оновити заяви-анкети, фото і паспорти надіслати нам разом зі зворотним сплаченим конвертом.

Olena Atamanchuk (see "UCC Saskatchewan welcomes..." below) covers the topic of inviting family members and friends to Canada: letter of invitation, application process and costs, required documents, processing times.

Проаналізувавши запити наших клієнтів, можна зазначити, що питання про те, як запросити родичів або друзів до Канади, є досить актуальним. Отже, давайте розглянемо, що для цього необхідно.

Для перетину кордону та перебування на території Канади, українцям потрібно отримати візу тимчасового перебування. Якщо це сімейний або дружній візит, то для подорожуючих потрібен лист-запрошення від родичів або друзів, які проживають у Канаді. У такому листі запрошувач має вказати **інформацію про особу, яку запрошують**: ім'я та прізвище; дата народження; адреса та номер телефону; відносини із особою, яка запрошує; мета подорожі; термін перебування в Канаді. А також **інформацію про запрошувача**: ім'я та прізвище; дата народження; адреса проживання в Канаді та номер телефону; професія; копія одного з документів, що підтверджують статус запрошувача, наприклад: копія картки постійного проживання чи копія паспорту громадянина Канади.

Особи, яким виповнилось 18 років, повинні особисто заповнити і підписати заяву. Зауважте, що заяву слід заповнювати в електронному варіанті. Щоб отримати штрих-код заяви, в кінці потрібно натиснути кнопку *«Validate»*, після чого роздрукувати та підписати
- Заява про склад сім'ї *Family Information form (IMM 5707)*, де потрібно вказати всю необхідну інформацію: ім'я, прізвище, дату народження, країну народження, відношення до заявника, сімейний стан, теперішню адресу та посаду кожної особи, вказаної у цій анкеті. Заповнювати заяву потрібно для кожного, кому виповнилось 18 років
- Заява про цивільний шлюб *Statutory Declaration of Common-law Union (IMM 5409)*, якщо це стосується заявника

Заявник може заповнити заяву самостійно або попросити чи найняти людину, яка зробить це за нього. У такому випадку потрібно додати:

- Заява на використання послуг представника *Use of a Representative (IMM 5476)*
- Заява на дозвіл передачі персональної інформації заявника для представника *Authority to Release Personal Information to a Designated Individual (IMM 5475)*

Перелік необхідних документів (документи, які видані не англійською або французькою мовами, мають бути перекладені та нотаріально завірені):

- **витанція про оплату розгляду вашої заяви та за послугу взяття біометричних даних**, починаючи з 31 липня 2018, заявнику буде необхідно зробити відбитки пальців та фотографії (біометричні дані) у Візовому Центрі Канади
- копія чинного паспорту громадянина України для виїзду за кордон кожної особи, яка потребує візу. Кожна дитина, незалежно від віку, повинна мати власний паспорт. Термін перебування в Канаді не може бути більшим, ніж термін дії паспорту, документ має мати мінімум дві чисті сторінки і бути дійсним не менше 6 місяців. Потрібно додати копію паспорта громадянина України (внутрішнього) сторінки з особистими даними та фотографією, сімейним станом, пропискою, та інші сторінки, на яких є відмітки.
- довідка на підтвердження наявності особистих коштів, як доказ того, що заявник зможе забезпечити своє перебування та членів сім'ї в Канаді. Це може бути офіційний лист з банку про рух коштів за останні 3 місяці; лист від працедавця

з місця роботи, виданий протягом останніх двох місяців, що підтверджує надання відпустки, де вказані: повне ім'я, посада і заробітна плата заявника. Якщо заявник має власний бізнес — надати підтвердження підприємницької діяльності (документ про реєстрацію підприємця, ліцензію, офіційний лист з банку про стан бізнес-рахунку за останні 6 місяців). Для пенсіонерів потрібно надати довідку про отримання пенсії з Пенсійного Фонду за останні 6 місяців. Або можна вказати у листі-запрошенні, що родина, яка запрошує, бере на себе всі витрати, що пов'язані з перебуванням подорожуючих.

- Копія свідоцтва про шлюб та свідоцтво(а) про народження неповнолітніх дітей. У разі розлучення свідоцтво про розлучення.
- Копія імміграційного статусу, у разі, якщо країна, яка вказана в паспорті громадянина, інша від країни на території якої проживає заявник (наприклад, посвідка на постійне або тимчасове проживання)
- Дозвіл на виїзд за кордон малолітніх дітей, які перетинають кордон самостійно, або лише одним із батьків чи з опікуном

Важливо зазначити, що якщо заявник не надасть всіх необхідних документів, то йому можуть відмовити або затримати розгляд справи. Неправдиві твердження чи подача підроблених документів призведуть до негайної відмови і заборони подавати заяву на будь-яку візу до Канади на наступні п'ять років.

Термін розгляду заяви оновлюється що два тижні:

Якщо розгляд заяви завершується позитивно, заявнику видають візу тимчасового перебування. Зазвичай, це багаторазова віза (Multiple Entry Visa), яка дійсна протягом 10 років. Зауважте, що термін разового перебування після перетину канадського кордону не повинен перевищувати 6 місяців. Якщо подорожуючим потрібно продовжити час візиту в Канаді, то до закінчення терміну перебування необхідно подати заяву на його продовження. Вартість такої послуги складає \$100.00. Тому, для подорожуючих, буде доцільно придбати страховий поліс компанії, яка є акредитованою, оскільки поліси лише цих компаній визнаються дійними на території Канади.

SaskTanets 2018 Summer Ukrainian Dance Program

UCC Saskatchewan's SaskTanets 2018 Summer Ukrainian Dance Program celebrated another successful year filled with growth. The program was just over a week long and included separate dancer and instructor camps. The goal for the Dancer Camp was to provide a healthy, safe environment for youth to learn about Ukrainian culture, dance and gain confidence to become young leaders in their communities. The Instructor Professional Development Workshop focused on giving instructors the tools to teach young dancers with care, knowledge and confidence.

The camp was moved to a new venue in Rosthern. The introduction of a new age category, 11-13 years, allowed an additional 15 dancers to attend. Both portions of the program were made longer, allowing all involved to learn an immense amount about Ukrainian dance and culture without becoming too overwhelmed or exhausted. A mentorship program was introduced, providing the recipients with knowledge and experience so they can teach confidently in their communities. A regional information booklet was developed and the program was videoed for the first time. Participants received T-shirts to wear with pride at dance classes.

All these changes proved positive and were an advancement to the program: the camp grew, a wider range of dancers was able to attend, and dancers and instructors alike collected valuable information about Ukrainian dance and culture.

One item that we have kept consistent, which truly makes our program special, is bringing instructors from Ukraine. Virsky Ensemble alumni Lana Niland and Andriy Demeshchuk were welcomed back to instruct for the third year. They brought a vast amount of knowledge, energy and inspiration—a huge part of keeping children involved in Ukrainian dance—to all of our participants.

On July 15th, 46 Ukrainian dancers ages 11-16 years from across Saskatchewan began a five-day program that consisted of over 30 hours of dance training, evenings filled with cultural activities, yoga and getting to know the other. The five days finished with a 90-minute performance for family and friends to demonstrate all that the dancers had learned.



"I loved camp and can't wait to come back next year," said one dancer participant. "I loved meeting other dancers and getting to learn new regions. Oh, and the food was awesome!"

On July 20th, 19 instructors from British Columbia, Alberta, Manitoba and Saskatchewan began three days of master classes. The 22 hours of instruction included the basics of teaching ballet, Ukrainian dance steps, acting and choreography. Focus was put on costumes, biomechanics, yoga and physiotherapy for dancers. The instructors took part in intense dance sessions as well. Participants stayed at the same facility which gave them the chance to talk dance and learn from each other.

The new mentorship program welcomed two young, aspiring dance teachers, who were selected to have hands-on learning under the supervision of Lana and Andriy and to assist with cultural activities during the Dancer Camp. Following this, they attended the Instructor Workshop. Both learned many new methods of teaching young dancers, how to safely guide them along in their Ukrainian dance classes and many cultural elements to add to choreography and class.

"Andriy and Lana's passion for Ukrainian dance has lit a fire inside of me," said an instructor participant. "I look forward to

the next dance season to utilize the information and skills they taught me with my own dance students. Thank you to the UCC Saskatchewan for putting on such a great workshop."

Being a mentee allowed me to learn how Ukrainians teach in Ukraine.

They have high expectations for their children, yet they still treat them with respect. They help them to gain the skills that can aid them in reaching high, but realistic goals. I was also able to learn how to correct kids and what to correct them on. As I am just starting my Ukrainian dance teaching career, seeing how professionals teach and choreograph was truly an asset. I learned how to create different combinations, which help kids properly learn basic and important Ukrainian and classical steps. Lana and Andriy both reminded me how important it is to give all children a solid base for Ukrainian dancing, as it will greatly help them in their futures.

Even though I was a mentee at the dance program, I felt I was able to be a mentor and role model for the children at the camp, and that they could turn to me for anything, whether it was for help with a dance step or getting the confidence to go out of their comfort zones and push themselves. This helped me to realize my love of dance even more and how much I love helping kids find their love of dance and be the best dancers they can be.

I am extremely grateful for the opportunity to take part in this Mentorship Program and learn as much as I can, from both students and instructors, to make myself into the best dance teacher I can be. — *Natalya Shevchuk*

■ This summer I had an amazing opportunity to mentor under instructors Lana Niland and Andriy Demeshchuk at the UCC SaskTanets Summer Dance Program. I'm no stranger to long and exhausting dance workshops being instructed by some of the most prominent names in the Canadian Ukrainian dance community, but this experience would be my first coming from the perspective of a teacher, rather than a dancer. Not only do these two instructors bring incredible Ukrainian dance knowledge and experience to the studio, but they also convey huge amounts of energy, excitement and passion to their students in a way that is truly inspiring for any up-and-coming dance instructor.

As a mentor, I had a chance to take a back seat in Lana and Andriy's lessons and really focus on their teaching methods and approach to instructing different age groups at various levels of dance. Although many of the lessons were similar to what is typically seen in Canada, they offered several unique ideas that I wish I had experienced much earlier so I could begin to include them in my own classes. In my opinion, however, it's their personality and determination which demands the best out of their students that is their biggest asset. I only wish I was able to capture every great comment, gesture or expression they used throughout the week to bring out the best in each and every student. Overall, the

mentorship program was a very positive experience for me and I encourage everyone that is qualified to consider applying for this program. Any time you are able to spend around highly trained, motivated and passionate individuals such as Lana and Andriy is bound to be incredibly rewarding. — *Landon Lavoy* •



Many of the grants are available only for incorporated nonprofit organizations or charitable organizations. However, a number of the grants are also open to unincorporated groups of individuals, municipalities, public educational institutions, as well as individuals. Please follow the website links to check your eligibility.

It is good practice to contact the office of the agency you are applying to before you start your application process. Coordinators of grant programs will clarify whether a particular




The cultural display was a



A Ukrainian Canadian Kid's Dance Tour in Ukraine

I'm a boy from Saskatchewan who loves to Ukrainian dance. I also went to a Ukrainian elementary school from Sadochok to grade 8. When I found out that I had the chance to actually go to Ukraine for a dance tour I was pretty excited.

Fifteen dancers from Rushnychok Ukrainian Folk Dance Association ranging from 5 to 16 years old got together and learned two dances that we would take to festivals in Saskatchewan and later perform in Ukraine. One of the dances was based off the Ukrainian-Canadian heel-toe polka, normally danced at celebrations. As you may know Ukrainians love to have parties, and it was cool to share this unique dance with audiences in Ukraine. The other dance was based off the Ukrainian traditional spring dances, hahilky. In school I learned the origins of the hahilky and so I appreciated the stories and symbolism in our dance.

To help pay for the trip, we started fundraising before the start of the school year, even before dance started: selling flowers during dance competitions and recitals, hosting a Halloween dance and a spring family dance, selling food at Ukrainian Day in the Park, and working at various city events. We even created and sold custom dance t-shirts and sweaters from our own brand, Poyas & Poppy. Some dancers did their own fundraising, like selling art at arts and craft shows. These fundraisers were a good chance for us to get to know all of the tour group families better and we had a lot of fun.

After over a year and a half of preparing the day finally arrived! It was time to go on this trip that we had been looking forward to! There were 32 in our tour group including dancers, parents, grandparents and friends. We didn't all leave Saskatoon on the same day. Our group that left August 7th had 19 people and started with a bit

of a misadventure. On the way there we got detoured to Winnipeg and later had to stay an extra day in Toronto. Then the airlines lost our luggage—twice! We eventually all made it to Lviv, a day later our luggage arrived too, and were happy to have the group all together.

We began our tour in Lviv where the International Ukrainian Dance & Culture Festival was happening. It started on Friday with the opening ceremonies that included performances by the amazing Bukovynian State Choir & Dancers. Saturday morning we had a 2-hour dance workshop at the Yunist Dance Studio. Even with the jet lag it was fun and we learned so much. Saturday afternoon was our first big performance on an outdoor stage in Rynok Square. The concert started and stopped a few times because of a thunderstorm, but we eventually got to perform both of our dances. As we were out in the city in our dance costumes we felt like celebrities. Locals and tourists were asking to take pictures of us and with us! It felt like the Paparazzi was after us, and this kept happening throughout the festival. We ended that night at a big zabava in a cool club at an old glass factory. On the second day of the festival we participated in a Commemorative Festival Parade dedicated to Ukrainians around the world, and two of our youngest dancers placed flowers at the foot of a Taras Shevchenko monument during a ceremony. Later we performed at Shevchenkivsky Hai outdoor museum. We finished our time in Lviv by performing in a gala performance and singing Ukraine's national anthem with all of the performers, led by the Bukovynian State Choir. Words can't describe what an honour it was to be part of such a spectacular event.

After Lviv we loaded the bus and travelled to the beautiful Carpathian Mountains. We got to see a pysanka museum, an old Hutsul church and house, and visit and bring gifts to a local orphanage. One of the best parts of our trip was the mock Hutsul wedding we attended where we experienced a sped-up version of a real Hutsul wedding. The bride and groom even rode horses to the church in full Hutsul outfits. There was lots of singing, dancing, food and entertainment and we all had an amazing time.

Next we went to Chernivtsi. It is called Little Vienna because it is beautiful and old. We took a walking tour and saw the university that looks like Hogwarts from Harry Potter. We learned that the song Chervona Ruta was written in Chernivtsi. We participated in a workshop in the nearby town of Mamayivtsi and worked with the young dance group Kolos. Their whole dance group was there and we got to partner and dance with them. After, we talked and took selfies with our new friends before going back to Chernivtsi. Our time here finished off with an amazing concert by Gerdan

(formerly Holos). I loved their singing and amazing drumming.


After Chernivtsi we went to Kamyanets-Podilsky, stopping on the way at Khotyn Fortress, which was built in the 10th century! I'd never heard of Kamyanets-Podilsky and had no idea that there were such ancient fortifications in Ukraine. A really long bridge led to the old city in Kamyanets-Podilsky. From it you could see down into the valley where there were houses and trees, and it was very beautiful. We had a dance workshop with the Kamianchanka Dance Ensemble where we got to learn the Podilia region style of dance. A highlight was hanging out and a banquet in the courtyard of the fortress. I had the most fun in this city because we had a lot of time to explore.

Our last city was Kyiv. The first day we had a workshop with the famous Virsky dancers and got to watch their rehearsal with their orchestra. The next day we went to a Virsky performance. Those Virsky dancers were amazing! We visited the Pyrohovo open-air museum, St. Sophia's Cathedral, and the Maidan Square. At the Maidan we learned about how the revolution started. One of our tour guides was actually there during the revolution. On our last day in Ukraine we got to dance at the Ukrainian Independence Day celebration. It seemed like a fitting end to a journey through this great country that we come from. Slava Ukraini!

Our trip to Ukraine was an unforgettable experience. On the last night of the trip at our dinner, and on the bus on the way to the airport the following day, many of the kids in our dance group took turns doing thank-you toasts and speeches. They listed the people and organizations who played a part in us getting to go. We are grateful to Cobblestone Freeway Tours for organizing and hosting the whole trip and to our tour guides, Sasha and Yulia, for taking such good care of us. We thank our parents for all the fundraising and driving and planning. After an extra overnight stay in Munich because of a missed transfer, we landed in Lviv on August 10th. We had a great experience watching the Bukovyna State Ensemble concert, which included live music and a full choir. The dancers then had a workshop with the group the next day. Tavria performed in a downtown concert (in the rain!) and at the beautiful outdoor museum, Shevchenkivsky Hai, the next day. Their hopak and girls Poltava dance were chosen to perform in the gala to wrap up the International Ukrainian Dance & Culture Festival. We were able to tour around the beautiful historical city as well as get in some shopping in the markets and shops.

We were then off to a beautiful resort in the mountain area of Kosiv in the heart of the Carpathians. After a stop at the Ukrainian Easter Egg museum in Kolomyya, we were very thankful for our bus driver, Yuriy, who navigated the winding dirt roads up the mountain. One of the highlights of the trip was the Hutsul wedding that we attended. The food, music, dancing and people were absolutely amazing! Thanks to our tour guides being very accommodating, we were able to take in the bazaar at Kosiv-which was kiosk after kiosk of anything you could ask for: from shoes, to mirrors, to fresh cheese, meat and fruit to amazing deals on Ukrainian clothing.

After that experience we were off to the city of Chernivtsi in the Bukovyna region, only 30 kilometres away from the Romanian border. A tour of the magnificent University and a day-trip to Kamyanets-Podilsky were definite highlights from this area. We were also fortunate enough to have a short concert by a singing group called Holos. They are an amazingly talented group and were very entertaining. The dancers had a workshop with the Bukovyna State Ensemble where they learned a Hutsul dance that they can't wait to perform.

Our next stop was Kyiv, but to get there was another adventure. We said goodbye to Yuriy, our amazing bus driver, and got on the train to take an overnight trip to Kyiv. The train ride is definitely something to experience! When we





arrived in Kyiv, we went on a few tours to some of the most popular sights, like St. Volodymyr's Cathedral, Maidan Nezalezhnosti, the Golden Gate, St. Michael's Cathedral, and St. Sophia's Cathedral, the oldest in Ukraine. The absolute highlight of any dancer's career came with a workshop with Virsky and then a chance to watch their concert. What an amazing opportunity! On Independence Day, the dancers again

performed at an outdoor park and we had one last amazing supper and impromptu zabava (which we shared for part of the night with Rushnychok from Saskatoon).

Finally our tour was over and on August 25th, with all of our memories, mementos and Ukrainian shirts/blouses. it was time to come home. We would like to thank Cobblestone Tours and Vince Rees for organizing a trip of a lifetime!

Extraordinary Sobor and Centenary Celebrations Held in Saskatoon

The nationwide Extraordinary Sobor of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of Canada was held in Saskatoon August 9-12, 2018. This Sobor was called to mark the 100th Anniversary of the church in Canada with its beginning roots in Saskatoon, December of 1918.

Sessions began each day with the Hierarchical Divine Liturgy, concelebrated by bishops, priests and deacons of the UOC across the world: His Eminence Metropolitan Yurij of Winnipeg and all Canada; His Grace Bishop Ilarion of Edmonton and Western Eparchy (recently appointed Exarch of the Ecumenical Patriarch to Ukraine); and, His Grace Bishop Andriv of the Eastern Eparchy. Representing Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew I of Constantinople were: His Eminence Metropolitan Sotirios - Greek Orthodox Church of Canada, Toronto and Exarch of the Ecumenical Patri-


Teaching Resource on the Holodomor Genocide Now Available

Printed in full colour, the richly illustrated book contains archival documents excerpted and translated for ease of use, timelines, maps, memoirs, photographs, eyewitness accounts, ageappropriate literary works, multimedia links and resource listings.

That lesson won two international awards for its visionary fusion of educational content, interactive teaching methodology and innovative technology into a seamless immersive learning experience for students. 

Wynyard Public Library Display of Landscape Paintings by Kharkiv Artist

Yuri Neroslik Wounded Serving as Volunteer Soldier in Eastern Ukraine

Paintings by a Ukrainian artist were on display recently at the Wynyard Public Library. The three works, oil landscapes on canvas, are by Yuri Neroslik, who lives in Kharkiv, Ukraine. The timing of the showing was meant to coincide with Ukrainian Independence Day, August 24.

"Patriotism means love for one's homeland," says Yuri, "not merely the love of an idea." He is a veteran of the Anti-Terrorist Operation against foreign soldiers and their collaborators who began their occupation of parts of Ukraine in 2014. Mr. Neroslik volunteered as a soldier with the 92nd Independent Mechanized Brigade of the Armed Forces of Ukraine. He was at the Battle of Ilovaisk in 2014, or as he says, "a full participant and eye-witness of the tragic events of the Ilovaisk ambush."

He survived and made his way back to safety, but needed to be hospitalized on account of his wounds. Following treatment and convalescence, he initially returned to his unit, and has since been demobilized.

Back in civilian life he resumed his work as an artist, of which he had many years experience prior to 2013-2014. Previously, he focused on romantic and lyrical themes in his paintings. The events of recent years "necessarily had an influence on my creative work," he states. In addition to land-scape paintings, he also produces computer designed posters on themes "of love

for one's native land and of patriotism." These placards find a special resonance among the troops of various military units throughout Ukraine.

A comment made about one of the landscape paintings at the Wynyard Public Library is an encouraging statement about Yuri Neroslik and his state of mind now that he is a military veteran back in civilian life. "It is very peaceful."
